## Girls' Night

On Friday, May 6th, 160 students participated in Girls' Night. Girls' Night is an event unique to UFA, which has been successfully held for the past 16 years. It is a night where all students who self-identify as female, girl, trans and gender non-conforming are invited to sleep over at the school to attend educational sessions focusing on empowerment and self-esteem. Girls' Night also promotes community, not just in the new friendships made between the participants, but also because it is an evening that is organized and facilitated by students for students. This year's event featured a Wen-Do self-defence workshop as well as a keynote address on intersectional feminism and how to work in solidarity with oppressed and racialized minorities through activism on social media and beyond. The students came together to enjoy a pot-luck feast, one of UFA's most celebrated traditions. During the evening, students registered for a variety of sessions that focused on body image and self-esteem, healthy relationships and

sexual health. Throughout structured free-time, students participated in karaoke, tie-dying, photo-booth, movie watching and music listening. We are grateful to all of the students and staff who volunteered their time and contributed to a successful event! Without this community support, the event would not be possible.

#### Rainbow Day

On Friday, May 27th, our school celebrated "Rainbow Day". This is time for our school community to take a united stand against discrimination, oppression and harassment. A "key" was posted on the second floor and posters were made that outlined the causes that students could choose to support by wearing an assigned colour. Once they had chosen a cause, the students were encouraged to wear a solid colour to stand-up for that particular cause. During the Rainbow Day announcement, students and staff spoke to each issue. Students were asked to stand to show their commitment to peace and social justice. They were then invited to pose for a yearbook photo outside of the school. In the spirit of community and social justice, classes were encouraged to take a few minutes following the Rainbow Day announcement to share the reasons behind why they selected the colour they wore. Student representatives from SASS (Students Against Stereotyping Sexuality) distributed a "Rainbow-gram" to all students. These were positive/supportive messages attached to a candy.

Ursula Franklin Academy has a long history of promoting safe and positive spaces within our community. Since we opened our doors, students and staff have been committed to providing each and every student with a safe, nurturing, positive and respectful learning environment. The SASS Wednesday session has been running since 2000 and continues to host meaningful and thoughtful discussions around issues of sexual and gender identity as well as how to confront homophobia, transphobia and other forms of discrimination.
